Backflow Prevention

Please have your passed backflow assembly test into our office by June 15th. After the 15th, accounts will be subject to fines and disconnection.

Meter Reading

We made spring reading adjustments this month in our Rimrock, Hillside, Honeysuckle Hills, and ????? systems. First month for reading meters will continue in May for the rest of the systems.

Accounts that have been estimated through the winter are adjusted based on the actual consumption recorded. Also, when the meters are read, the crew paint the meter lids and trim any shrubs that obstruct access to the meter box.

Board Seats

We have three Board seats open for election and we have three people running for these seats. Therefore, there will be no need for an election. The three Board members will be Shirley Stoller, returning; Jack Hern, returning; and Fred Ogram, new Board member.

Returning Snowbirds

Returning snowbirds, please, contact the office two business days prior to needing your water turned on. If you ask for the water to be turned on without notice, you will be charged a \$50 service fee.

Conservation Tip

We're more likely to notice leaks indoors, but don't forget to check outdoor faucets, sprinklers and hoses for leaks.



Rebate Offer

We have a one-time rebate offer on the purchase of rain sensors, soil moisture sensors, xeriscaping, hose bib timers, water conserving sprinkler heads, and dual flush toilets.

If you purchase one of these devices, the District will give you up to a \$75 rebate credit. You must be the homeowner and a customer. You will need to fill out a form at the office and attach your receipt of purchase and the UPC symbol on the box. This is a one-time offer. The rebate is 75% of the purchase price, up to \$75. Call 811 Before You Dig

Spring is here and hopefully the weather will be cooperating by the time you receive this newsletter. People will be excitedly beginning those spring projects after the long winter. Whether you are planting trees, beginning a new garden, building a new deck or making a new sidewalk, digging can be dangerous if you do not know where your utility lines are.

Be sure to call 811 before you dig for any reason at any depth. You need to call 48 hours before you begin your project. All utility companies will come to your residence and mark the utility lines. This is a free service to you. If the utility lines are not marked and you hit one, the repair is your responsibility and could be expensive. If you hit an electric line or a gas line, it could be deadly.

Update Phone Numbers and E-Mail Addresses

We have made an adjustment to our statements. You will now see your current phone number and e-mail address printed on your statement. Please let us know if our information is incorrect. This can be very important in the event of a water emergency. For example, it is essential to call homeowners in the event they have a large leak that they are unaware they have. Large leaks can cause damage. If we see something, we will turn the meter off to prevent more damage. The customers are not always home and we want to call them to inform them of the situation.
